## WE THE UNDERSIGNED:

- 1. **Appreciate** your ongoing efforts to enhance the City's recycling program (the "Program"), your willingness to read and carefully consider this petition.
- 2. **Recognize** that Houston is a city of sufficient size that there are <u>economic</u>, <u>environmental</u>, <u>and moral imperatives</u> to have a high quality Program, as measured against American cities of similar size.
- 3. **Believe** that the current Program efforts are insufficient, inferior to comparable cities, and require additional effort and resources.
- 4. **Request** that the following be <u>immediately</u> undertaken *with your leadership and in conjunction with City Council*:
  - A. Formal adoption of "waste diversion rate" as the <u>primary metric</u> for measuring success of the Program, with regular tabulation and public release thereof. Waste diversion rate shall be defined as the sum of recycled volume, composted volume, and source volume reduced divided by total waste volume.
  - B. Integration of the Program with the City's "regular" waste disposal program so that the overall waste management system is considered and budgeted in a comprehensive manner.
  - C. To encourage greater public participation in the Program, implementation of <u>variable user fees</u> for "regular" waste collection, the central features being implementation of variable size collection bins, with (1) price increasing proportional to bin size, and (2) a no-fee baseline small bin.
  - D. Expanded <u>acceptance of materials</u> currently refused by the Program, such as glass and building materials.
  - E. Expanded <u>coverage</u> of the Program to include currently neglected communities, including apartment/condo dwellers and commercial businesses.
  - F. Implementation of <u>regulatory mandates</u> where applicable, including (a) a requirement that locally permitted commercial businesses additionally submit for approval and subsequently follow comprehensive waste disposal and recycling plans, and (b) regulation of other waste disposal businesses such that they too must be in compliance with City Program-related regulations.
  - G. Implementation of industry <u>best practices</u>, including such Program initiatives as food waste recycling/composting from local restaurants and food stores, and recycling/re-use of demolished building materials by construction developers.
  - I. Creation of plans to gradually and appropriately bring about <u>mandatory public participation</u> in the Program.
  - J. Creation of formal and ongoing contacts, visitations, and study of <u>comparable city programs</u> for the express purpose of implementing ongoing improvements to the Program.

One is the cost of hauling the trash to the landfill. As the number of landfills has dropped, the average hauling distance has gone up, and with it, the price. The second factor is the cost of building and operating landfills to meet the latest environmental standards. New facilities have clay or plastic linings to prevent chemicals from seeping into groundwater. I'm not a scientist bu will add a third cost: the release of carbon dioxide and methane into the atmosphere as a result from the burning of fuel to transport more garbage than is necessary. This contributes to global warming and the local urban heat island effect. So there you have it. There is a cost incentive to increase recycling that appeals to fiscal conservatives who might not take to comparisons with San Francisco but are well acquainted with the cost of fuel. There is also an environmental incentive to everyone concerned with global warming. The best recycling program will be highly localized starting with organic material such as leaves, tree branches, cuttings, etc. They can be broken down and reused without ever leaving the neighborhood. The second phase should be non-animal food recycling within neighborhood. The second phase should be non-animal food recycling within neighborhood. This approach will both save trucking fuel and its CO2, and foster community cooperation as a positive side effect. I'm currently recycling both of these materials on my property with no difficulty. I am a native Houstonian that moved away from '89-'04 and recycling has been a source of contention for me for the past 4 years since moving back (Ms. Marks should look into the City of Dallas' recycling program if she wants to only compare Houston to other Texas cities - they're doing something right up there). Below is a paste and copy of an email I sent to the Director of Solid Waste Disposal just last week: I am emailing you today with great frustration and despair over the City of Houston?s current recycling program (or lack thereof, in my case). I am a native Houstonian that moved away for 15 years and moved back to make Houston my home 4 years ago. I can?t believe that in 2008, it is so difficult to recycle in a city of our size. I don?t know if you personally recycle and are aware of the pains that must be taken in order to keep recyclable items out of our landfills. Perhaps you are fortunate enough to live in one of the few neighborhoods that already have curbside recycling. I do not. I have to clean and separate all of my recyclable items daily, which amounts to about 85% of all of my waste. I have to hold on to the items until they overflow in their designated space in my garage. Then, I have to load up my car with all of this recyclable waste and spend my time and gas (now at \$3.55/gallon) to take it to one of the sparsely located drop sites. I live on the NW side of the city. I have to drive to the Heights to an unmanned drop site where I have to park my car in the middle of a dangerous lot. I then have to walk to each of the 5 or 6 huge dumpsters are completely full and I have to lay the items beside the dumpsters. Also, the dumpsters are typically ?contaminated? with items that are not ?allowed? in that dumpster. I go through this process about twice per month and have been doing so since I moved here 4 years ago. I know other residents in my neighborhood
